Hitting the news with bus privatisation facts

Last week Channel 7 broadcasted the evidence loud and clear - commuters do not want their public buses to be sold off into public hands.

A ReachTEL poll of residents in the electorates of Coogee, Ryde, the Northern Beaches and Drummoyne – all areas bus drivers believe could be next on the NSW Government's privatisation hit list – reveals commuters are by and large happy with their current bus services and believe the only people set to benefit from privatisation are the private companies themselves and the government – not commuters.

The NSW Government has already announced the privatisation of 'region 6' buses in Sydney's inner-west and Transport Minister, Andrew Constance, has suggested further privatisation could be on the cards.

Rail, Tram and Bus Union (RTBU) Tram and Bus Divisional Secretary, Chris Preston told media that the poll findings highlight serious commuter concerns about privatisation and show NSW residents aren't buying the Government's rhetoric.

"The overwhelming majority of people do not want buses in their area sold off to private companies," Mr Preston said.

"This should act as a real wake up call to the NSW Government. Commuters are making it very clear that they do not want their services privatised.

"Commuters simply aren't buying the rubbish the Transport Minister is sprouting about privatisation being good for us. Everyone can see right through the spin. They know that the only people set to benefit from privatisation are the private companies themselves and the NSW Government."

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


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Hitting the streets to protect NSW public transport from privatisation

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No confidence in Constance

On October 13 we rallied in Newcastle to present 60 signed motions of No Confidence against the incompetent Minister for Transport, Andrew Constance We could feel the anger and frustration in the air as we joined with transport workers from across divisions in Newcastle.

We had members there whose pay has been wrong for months, and while Constance and Keolis call them "teething problems", that buck doesn't pass with us. The Minister was more interested in palming off the Newcastle buses into private hands than he was concerned about workers, their jobs, and commuters – who are now all paying the price.

This Minister has no interest in improving jobs or transport in Newcastle. He's just interested in keeping his mates happy and attacking jobs and unions.

He started his privatisation scheme in Newcastle, and now he's doing the same thing with the region 6 buses in Sydney. And we know it's not the end. Constance's tenure has been full of transport failures, budget blow-outs and decisions which continuously put his own greed above commuter interests.

We've had enough.

We're proud of the workers across the state who have taken a stand and moved motions of no confidence in the Transport Minister, Andrew Constance as we presented them in Newcastle.
