Defective bus? Refuse to drive it



Drivers are being disciplined for refusing to drive unsafe defective buses through Sydney traffic, despite admissions by State Transit Authority (STA) that drivers risk fines by doing so. Members have been issued infringement notices by STA but as far as the police are concerned, the driver is breaking the law.

NOBODY can instruct you to break the law. If a supervisor/radio room tries to force you to drive an unsafe defective vehicle, you should refuse on safety grounds and wait for a changeover. You should advise the Union immediately

and the Union will support you.

Your local health and safety representative (HSR) should be notified as soon as possible.

Keep relevant notes on your journal including any attempts to intimidate you to continue driving the vehicle in question. Division Secretary Chris Preston said drivers were asked to drive buses with smashed blinkers, high beam fixed on, brake lights not working and back doors flapping open.

"Drivers are concerned that STA is taking a hardline approach when an accident or maintenance issue arises while the bus is in service. All drivers see it as part of their job to consider the safety of passengers and other motorists and comply with road rules. When they deem a bus is unsafe to drive they rightly request that it be taken out of service and replaced.

Chris said union was backing members who had been disciplined and called on the Transport Minister to intervene. "The RTBU is calling on the Minister to step in and back the drivers on this issue."

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Light rail grounded after derailments



Buses have been replaced trams for some weeks now following the grounding of light rail after two cases of derailments.

There is no suggestion of driver error and instead the issue seems to originate from a new section of track that was not compatible with the trams.

The Tram and Bus Division want to give a big thank you firstly to the drivers of the STA buses that Veolia has resorted to hiring to cover the grounded trams.

The Division would also like to congratulate the light rail delegates who have been supporting drivers and keeping everyone informed.
